Note to Students, Teachers, Librarians, Admin & School Boards -

As an educator for many years, Sara de Waard has borne witness to the heartbreaking yet remarkable strength of her students, and firmly believes that their hardships should not be minimized. Instead, we should be declaring teen mental health a leading cause of concern in society and providing them with the support and resources needed to give them a fighting chance at life.

In White Lies, we are introduced to Missy, a girl who has experienced great loss and would rather push it all down than let it all out. Her sweet sixteenth is just around the corner, but with her mother in jail and her father's tendency to alcohol-induced rages, she doesn't expect anything special. It's not like her last three birthdays have exactly been cause for celebration. Her mom was arrested just before she could blow out the candles on her fifteenth birthday, and her beloved little brother died when she turned thirteen. Now birthdays are just a painful reminder of the void in their lives, and even three years later Missy can't help but feel responsible. If only she had walked her brother to school that morning, like she was supposed to...

To escape her guilt and horrid home life, Missy volunteers at a nearby store where she busies herself to shut out the emotions that her therapist is pushing her to feel. But then she meets Luke – her new classmate, a half-Native boy she cannot stop thinking about. Luke understands what she is going through more than anybody, but will Missy ever be able to let him in?

In White Lies, Sara de Waard delves into the myriad ways in which grief affects the mental health and emotional behavior of young teens, and does not shy away from the lived realities of parental abuse for so many students. Despite the book's subject matter, however, de Waard's debut novel offers no shortage of hope, love, and a belief in the importance of emotional healing.




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


Big Questions to Check-in on your comprehension

Gr8 Cross-Curricular Connection Ideas

MATH

Retro Toy Assignment - have the students research retro toy inventory then decide how much they need to sell it for to make a profit running a store with two employees, for a month (include cost of inventory, rent, hydro, water, gas and employee pay).

Living Expenses Assignment - have the students research the costs of the living expenses a single person pays to rent a property, pay the bills and survive for one month.

Birthday Party Assignment - have your students imagine that they are Luke with a budget of \$1000 and then have them research ideas & costs for a dream birthday party, perfect for Missy's 16th.

Minimum Wage Assignment - have your students research the cost for one year away at college or university then have them determine how many hours they'd need to work a minimum wage job during high school, to pay for that year.
